

Our proposal was accepted and the contract will be signed by all parties and forwarded to the Synod Bishop. We will be sharing this pastor with St. John's starting on March 1st! His first Sunday here will be March 6th and he will serve alternating Sundays between the two churches. On the off Sunday, we will have a supply or lay person conduct our service. In the near future, we will announce information about this person, but he needs to give his church 30 days' notice first. We will retain our 2 services and our mid-week Lenten services as well. In the meantime, our church council will soon begin the call process of finding a permanent pastor for us by selecting a call committee and making an information booklet for the Bishop to use in his search for a replacement. If you have any questions, please ask a council person or use the papers and pencils on the lobby table and place your question along with your name (so we can contact you with the answer) in the basket. As we get more information, we will announce our progress.

WE INVITE YOU TO PRAY...

Today we think of crossing the index and middle finger as a wish for luck! The terms ‘keep your fingers crossed,’ ‘fingers crossed’, or ‘cross your fingers’ are all common sayings for this.

We also use this gesture behind our backs when telling a lie or to invalidate a promise we are making!

But did you know this has origins in Mosaic Law. Judges would say, ‘May God have mercy on your soul’ when passing a death sentence, to recognize God’s supreme authority over the law and that only God had the authority to destroy souls! They were praying for the person’s soul when they said this!

For us as Christians, in the days of the early church, especially during times of persecution, people used this as a sign of the cross. Just as the outline of the fish drawn in the sand or dirt was used to find out if a stranger was a believer in Jesus the Christ, so, too, a believer would cross their fingers to make this sign of the cross to see if the other responded in kind acknowledging they too were a believer!

Besides making the ‘V’ with our fingers at the passing of the peace during worship in this time of COVID, we can also use the crossed fingers as a sign of the cross!
