We greet each other with a nod or gesture of Christian fellowship from a distance, and we also invite you to text or email a word of peace to someone. The peace of Christ be with you always.





INSIDE WORSHIPERS: Ushers will dismiss you by pew, then please allow a six-foot distance from other households as you approach the altar by the center aisle (tape marks in the center aisle are a helpful guide). Please take an empty glass if you wish to receive wine, or a glass prefilled with grape juice. The pastor will place the consecrated wafer into your outstretched palms so that you may receive the body of Christ. Then proceed to one of the chalices where the wine will be poured, or where you will drink the prefilled glass. Those not receiving Holy Communion are invited to come forward to receive a no-touch blessing.

OUTSIDE WORSHIPERS: The Lord's Supper will be brought to those outside by a Communion Assistant, who will use an intinction set so that the consecrated wafer can be dipped in the grape juice, in order to receive the loving body and blood of Christ.

WE INVITE YOU TO PRAY... Have you ever looked around at your brothers and sisters who are worshiping with you while service is taking place? Some look around during sermon time. Others look around while singing a hymn. Maybe we look around while the anthem is being sung, or the organist is playing a prelude or postlude, or to see the expressions on faces during a Baptism. Sometimes we observe others while receiving Holy Communion or afterwards at their seats praying...... or maybe looking around!

At a Spiritual Direction retreat, during the first session, one of the 4 leaders shared with us that we occasionally will see her eyes closed while another leader is making a presentation. 'No,' she said, 'I am not sleeping or resting my eyes! I am praying for the leader, for all gathered as a group here, for individuals, and for anything else where the Spirit is leading me!'

Here at Jerusalem, whether your eyes are closed or open or looking around at others when we are gathered in Christ, allow yourself to be moved by the Holy Spirit. Pray as the Spirit guides for what we are about as God's people, not just as a community, but for individuals gathered in this space at this particular moment! May this become a holy habit during worship and beyond!

INTRODUCING PASTOR LARRY LAINE

Starting Sunday, March 6th, Jerusalem will share an interim minister with St. John's Lutheran in Friendensburg. Over the next three weeks, Pastor Laine will share some information about himself. Below is about how he grew up:

Larry D. Laine, born in 1945 – that would be in the last century! I was a breech birth baby. Once I got my face turned around, I turned out to be a cute little 8-pound baby. But that didn't last long.

My mom and dad, my older sister and my older brother helped grow me up on a dairy grape farm, (100 acres of alfalfa and 100 acres of grapes). To keep things consistent we milked 100 cows, two times a day, even on Sundays. Sanger was the closest town. We lived on a branch, a tributary of the San Joaquin River, which came down from the high Sierra-Nevada Mountains. Sometimes the water came down so fast that it flooded our house which was way too close to the river.

I went to school – an 'L' shaped brick building with 4 separate rooms for the 30 to 40 kids from 1^{st} to 8^{th} grade. I think there were 4 teachers and one principal. I didn't know the teachers really well, but I knew the principal. He and I spent a lot of time in his office just talking, although he wasn't really talkative. When he did talk, believe me I listened. I listened really well.

I missed the principal when I went to high school. In elementary school I loved recess. It was my favorite class. I was always the first one out on the ball diamond, or the flag football field, or the b-ball court. I was even the first to get on the teeter-totter. In high school I was different. I signed up for every recess class they offered. I loved it so much that they gave me 16 big letters over the course of my 4 years. However, it was always the same letter, as if I had never seen a "C" before. I saw a lot of "C" s. They was all over my report card from the other classes I had to take.

Somehow, I graduated from high school and matriculated into college. It may have been because of a recommendation from my elementary school principal. Or not! So, I went. That is where I really found some direction in my life. However, you are going to have to wait until next week to hear about that.
