AFFIRMATION OF BAPTISM – THE RITE OF CONFIRMATION

Confirmation marks the completion of the congregation's program of confirmation ministry, a period of instruction in the Christian faith as confessed in the teachings of the Lutheran Church. Those who have completed this program were made members of Christ's Church in Baptism. Confirmation includes a public profession of the faith into which the candidates were baptized, thus underscoring God's action in the Baptism.

Dear friends, we give thanks for the gift of baptism and for these people, one with us in the body of Christ, who are making public affirmation of their baptism.

Those making affirmation are presented by a representative of the congregation: I present <u>name/s</u>, who desire to make public affirmation of their baptism. Let us pray.

Merciful God, we thank you for these sisters,

whom you have made your own by water and the Word in baptism.

You have called them to yourself,

enlightened them with the gifts of your Spirit,

and nourished them in the community of faith.

Uphold your servants in the gifts and promises of baptism,

and unite the hearts of all whom you have brought to new birth.

We ask this in the name of Christ.

Amen.

I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church.

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God?

Response by each confirmand: I renounce them.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God?

Response by each confirmand: I renounce them.

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

Response by each confirmand: I renounce them.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty,

creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord,

who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,

born of the virgin Mary,

suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, died, and was buried;

he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again;

he ascended into heaven,

he is seated at the right hand of the Father,

and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit,

the holy catholic church,

the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins,

the resurrection of the body,

and the life everlasting.

You have made public profession of your faith. Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

Response by each confirmand: I do, and I ask God to help and guide me.

People of God, do you promise to support these sisters and pray for them in their life in Christ?

We do, and we ask God to help and guide us.

Those making affirmation kneel. The minister and Faith & Families Director lay a hand on the head of the person:

Stir up in <u>name</u> the gift of your Holy Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence, both now and forever.

Amen.

Let us rejoice with these sisters in Christ.

We rejoice with you in the life of baptism. Together we will give thanks and praise to God and proclaim the good news to all the world.

The pastor, who has thoroughly disinfected his/her hands, will drop the consecrated wafer into your outstretched palms. Then we ask that you maintain a six-foot distance as you make your way toward the table that is holding prefilled glasses arranged far enough apart to take one without touching another. First lower your mask, then eat the host, and finally take

either a glass of wine or grape juice. As you leave, drop the used glass in the nearby basket, replace your mask, and then sanitize your hands – and rejoice that although this is different, that we can resume receiving the Lord's Supper if we continue to strive to keep one another safe with precautions.

UPCOMING SUNDAY FESTIVALS AND OBSERVANCES

- ALL SAINTS' SUNDAY. November 1, remembers all the saints of God, both dead and living. We will give thanks for the newly baptized, remember members and friends of the congregation who have died in the past year, and give thanks for the many other saints whose witness has influenced our lives.
- CELEBRATION OF THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST ORDINATION OF WOMEN IN THE LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA, November 15. Finally realizing that despite several negative verses in scripture about women in leadership, many more verses in the New Testament include and speak of women leading the church – most notably Paul in Galatians 3:28 "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." – We began ordaining women in 1970 (the first woman of color was not ordained until 1980).

THE FREEDOM OF A CHRISTIAN, a pamphlet by Martin Lutheran was written 500 years ago in 1520 by Martin Luther, and like many of his writings, became a "best seller" throughout 16th century Europe. One was asymptomatic, one we sick at home, and two spent over a week in an intensive care unit. In addition, we know of three relatives of church members who have died. Despite some voices in our society that want to shrug off the virus and live normally, we believe that Christian love and concern call us to continue to take precautions both here on Sunday and throughout the week. Please wear your masks, social distance, and be cautious with family and public gatherings and travel.

IN THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER, we remember some of the witnesses that surround us as we prepare to receive the Meal. It is fitting on this Reformation Sunday that a sampling of Lutheran reformers and witnesses are named. Here are very brief descriptions of their ministries:

• Luther, the lead reformer, of course of the 16th century German-centered reformation, who among other things, Translated the Bible from Hebrew and Greek into German

so that everyday people could read it (before that, the public readings were in Latin).

- **Melancthon**, Luther's colleague and scholar who wrote the Augsburg Confession, the central reformation document that described Lutheran teaching.
- **Muhlenberg**, the 18th century German missionary to Colonial America who evangelized and organized the Lutheran church in this country.
- **Fedde**, a Norwegian Deaconess who came to American in the late 19th century to organize the Lutheran Deaconess community in America in order to serve the poor.
- **Katie Luther**, not only Luther's wife, but an articulate witness and leader for the gospel in Wittenberg, where she hosted dignitaries and fed many poor students.
- Cranach, reformation artist, and publisher of reformation writings.
 Also friend to Martin and Katie Luther, and godparent to several of their children.
- Bach, the 18th century Lutheran composer set so much scripture to
 music that he has been called after Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, the
 Fifth Evangelist.
- **Nicolai**, the 16th century composer elevated chorales and hymns in the life of the church, the most famous of which is "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright!" (#308).
- **Nommensen**, a Danish missionary to Sumatra, where the gospel he preached established the Batak Lutheran Church in Indonesia which now numbers 4,000,000 people.
- **Kierkegaard**, a 19th century Danish philosopher and theologian, who wrote against the dry, state-run Danish Lutheran Church, and urged instead a faith that was passionately lived in life.
- **Bonhoeffer**, the 20th century pastor, theologian, and writer who until his martyrdom, helped lead the confessing Lutheran church in its opposition to Hitler.
- **Hammarskjold**, a Lutheran layman who as a Swedish diplomat became the Secretary General of the United Nations. Believing that diplomacy was his Christian vocation, he was killed in a plane crash in 1961 while trying to broker a peace treaty between warring factions in the Congo.
